

Mr. Mark A. Scott:
Cyber-Safety and Beyond

Mr. Mark A. Scott has taken the safety program to a whole new level. His innovative software that incorporates both mishap investigation and mishap reporting has been revolutionary. Mr. Scott, occupational safety and health specialist, coordinated installation of the facility management assistant (FMA) program, an intranet system, which resulted in immediate notification and investigation of mishaps to discover the root cause and to prevent recurrence. He also administered the newly launched safety website, “Workplace Safety Information System” (WSIS), which engages in three primary objectives: to report and track mishaps, to identify and correct unsafe behaviors, and to communicate safety information across the command. Mr. Scott has led more than 300 mishap investigations within Camp Lejeune, resulting in remarkable decreases in mishap rates. Under Mr. Scott’s safety leadership, the civilian injury rate has been reduced from 49 percent in FY00 to 12.7 percent in FY04. As the safety division certified operational risk management trainer, Mr. Scott implemented advanced technologically based safety programs, as well as poster campaigns and briefs to create a sound safety environment on all levels. For his professional demeanor, innovative programs, and steadfast leadership performance, Mr. Scott is the recipient of the Marine Corps Superior Achievement in Safety Award.



Gunnery Sergeant Tommy Fair:
Safety Is Contagious

Gunnery Sergeant Tommy Fair, safety officer for Fleet Support Division Albany, spearheaded the development, implementation, and preservation of its safety program with great enthusiasm and commitment that only could be described as “contagious.” The unit’s mission involves extensive warehousing, materiel handling, and movement and maintenance of thousands of ground-equipment parts every year. Although it is a high-risk environment for operational mishaps, GySgt Fair executes an aggressive quarterly inspection program, checks for ORM for every task, and conducts “on the spot” safety stand-downs to correct unsafe conditions. His actions directly contributed to the Division’s 2003-2004 Base Safety Award, which recognized 365 days of zero lost-time mishaps and 209 days without a mishap of any kind. Fleet Support Division Albany has not experienced a lost-time mishap for more than 649 days, due to GySgt Fair’s dedication, hard work, and continuous pursuit of safety. Additionally, he serves as the unit security officer, managing special projects, while completing 23 courses in safety within the last two years.

Gunnery Sergeant Fair is presented the Marine Corps Superior Achievement in Safety Award for his efforts to manage an aggressive safety program and to successfully spread eagerness and enthusiasm about the safety culture. **GW**
